Following the confusion from the receipt of certain letters in reply to certain applications to the Home Housing Association Limited for consideration for the new Rented housing currently under construction off Silver Street Ms Carol Ramsay, their Housing Officer, attended the recent Parish Council Meeting. Ms Ramsay apologised for the confusion and stressed that those replies should never have been sent. Ms Ramsay confirmed that no houses have been allocated and would not until such time as each applicant has been interviewed by a member of staff from the Housing Association: probably early in the New Year. Ms Ramsay confirmed the article which featured in our first edition that the housing was for local people and that all applicants would be considered. FOURUM CONCERT

"Take a walk up the hill to Gunnerside Ghyll, every step takes you back in time" Familiar words too many people who live in our dale and written by Allen Miller, researcher and songwriter from the Folk group Fourum.

All four voices are now in perfect working order and ready to blend in harmony on songs such as 'Swaledale', 'Reeth Green', 'Potter Thompson', 'The Drummer Boys of Richmond' and many others. The other members of the group are Sandy Still, Jim Jack, Bob Hattersley and Red Hall with 'Victoria', his double bass.

Tickets for the concert are on sale at various shops and cost £2 for adults and £1 for children. The event commences at 7.30. Refreshments will be available during the interval. Proceeds from the evening will be donated to The Yorkshire Schools Fund for South American Expedition.

Training for South America

15 year old Richmond School student, Davina Hepworth of Muker, recently spent a weekend in the Peak District training for an expedition to South America in August 1996 with the Yorkshire Schools Exploring Society.

Last June she spent a demanding weekend at Selside, near Ribbleshead, undergoing various selection tasks, including her first experience of caving. Seventy students from Yorkshire and Humberside had applied for places on expeditions to South America and the Yukon. Much to her amazement, Davinia was chosen and will now travel to La Paz (the highest capital in the world at over 11,000ft) along with 15 other students and 7 leaders to undertake a series of treks which will include Lake Titicaca, the Altiplano and the upper reaches of the Amazon. Davina, a keen athlete and hockey player, sits GCSEs next summer. She has always wanted to travel.

She is now fund-raising to help pay for the £2,000 cost of the expedition and has already had a successful car boot sale selling unwanted books and records and hopes to be equally successful at future sales. FOURUM will be performing at Reeth Memorial Hall on Saturday 21 October to help boost funds.

Other training weekends will be in the Lake District and Scotland over the coming months.

Rented Housing Update - see feature

Market Report - Market receipts are showing an increase over last year but now that the main holiday season is over the number of stalls may decrease. Hopefully another fishmonger will appear over the coming weeks.

Street Lighting - certain works have now started on Back Lane. Some flexibility has been negotiated with Earl Peel regarding the wayleave agreement should columns be necessary on the Green. A new light at High Fremington is currently causing problems because of high costs but we are working closely with Richmondshire District Council on the problem.

Healaugh - Following certain works a local drainage problem has been temporarily resolved. The permanent solution should be part of the scheme currently under discussion for the Square. Yorkshire Water have accepted some responsibility for the blocked culvert on Greenyates Lane and some works should be started in the near future.

Bungalow Improvements - whilst this Parish Council supports the concerns of the residents during the necessary improvements we have found the Richmondshire District Council Clerk of Works very cooperative. It is pleasing to report that the works appear to be on schedule and to a high standard.

Rural Transport - a representative from Royal Mail has visited the Clerk and discussed very supportingly the issue of a Post Bus. Having full regard

to the current delivery/collection schedules for Royal Mail and the geography of the two Dales such a scheme is currently impractical. Any such scheme would also need grants from the County Council. We have been assured that the current service as operated by United is not being withdrawn.

Memorial Hall - our next issue will feature a report from the meeting about refurbishment projects held on 4th October.

Bonfire and Fireworks Display - see feature.

Since the popular announcement at the last Meeting that the Council would control this event certain fund raising events have been organised. In the interim funding is required to order the Fireworks. After certain deliberations during which Coun. James Kendall made it very clear that he considered such a proposal was stupid and a waste of money it was agreed that some funds would be made available on the understanding that the Council be reimbursed from any fund raising and donations. The event is being coordinated with the local Fire Station. Any donations can be handed in at the Post Office. See also elsewhere in this issue for details of fund raising events.

Bulbs - see feature.

Annual Fair - It was confirmed that Clifton Payne would as usual be allowed to have his fair on the Green over the usual two weeks for August Bank Holiday and Reeth Show 1996.

Road Repairs - correspondence from

County Highways regarding the lack of current funding for repairs to minor roads was noted.

Waiting Restrictions - County Highways confirmed the recommendations from a recent site meeting to extend waiting restrictions on a narrow section of Arkengarthdale Road; the High Green; and opposite the Fire Station.

Grants - see feature.

White Lines - on the High Row at the entrance to the Mews. The fault /mistake is with the contractor used by County Highways and will be rectified in due course.

Mower - the Council has now taken delivery of the new Mower.

Once again because of the large attendance the Chairman opened the last part of the meeting for public debate.

Next Meeting will be Monday 30th October at 7pm. Healaugh residents are urged to attend for an update on the Square project.

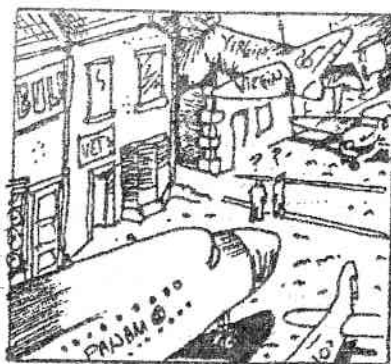

Memorandum of the Premabling of the Boundary betwix Lord Thomas, Marquis of Wharton, Lord of Swaledale and Charles Bathurst Esq., Lord of Arkengarthdale.

Which was shewed and told to me Lord Wensley the 17th of June 1770 by Daniel Galloway who was there at the time of dispute The Lord of Swaledale and the Lord of Arkendale had appointed a day when they were to have a joint ride, which was agreed to begin at Foregill Gate and to proceed towards the west so long as their liberties contained together - where several ancient men came to attend them that had known the particulars of the boundary - and that he remembered they met the Marquis of Wharton and Squire Bathurst at this Foregill Gate and that one, Ralph Fryer brought one horse laden with white bread and another with ale where it was placed for any that would choose to eat or drink. And a contest arose betwixt Wharton and Bathurst, for Bathurst pretended to ride up Bleaberry Gill beck, but Wharton produced a boundary very ancient and shewed that his right was to go as the Water of Heaven divides to Mossy Thorn and then began his ride as the water divides towards the north west for one mile and a half or near abouts - and then came to this Mossy Thorn or part of ground so called, but this mark or boundary was removed and judged to be removed by one William Colling.

Then proceeding - but more to the west - for half a mile to some shafts that had been sunk by one David Kherton, Hutton Hutchinson and Watson for the late Philip, Lord Wharton, which was as far to the east as his liberties extended, but had been watered out, and that they were sunk for the range or random of Old Moulds Vein.

Then proceeded by linyal line to Bleaberry Gill beck which was near one mile, leaving Weirshaw Well rather to the east but not above twenty yards.

They were in dispute at this well also whether it was in Wharton's liberty or no - but one William Whittle laid down to drink and said he would drink Lord Wharton's health of his own water, when one George Trooper put his head to the well - which caused a contest for Bathurst, thinking he had spoken in favour of Wharton when he mentioned "his own water", said - "if it please you my Lord, what do you give per dozen for such men?" Wharton answered immediately and said "I scorn you Mr. Bathurst". He shewed me some shafts also about 300 yards to the west from this well which were sunk by this Watson & Co. who sank the aforementioned shafts.

On the 14th of September 1770 Mr. Edward Elliott sending for Daniel Galloway to the house of Robert Elliott's desiring him to show him records of the Boundary and tell him how far the liberties of Arkengarthdale extended to the south west and to tell him some remarks of the Boundary, who made him answer and said he could have told and showed him some particulars if him and his brother Thomas had not set up fresh boundaries where he confessed they removed some sods but it was with Mr. Close's consent.

13th October - I, Lord Wensley, was at Booze at Thomas Coate's where happened in company with Jonathon Kipling, we being in discourse concerning these boundaries - when he told me that he was present at the height of Pinseat when Edward Elliott and Thomas Stodart set up a boundary one hundred yards or more to the west from Pinseat which they thought might be Heavenwater.

The Scott Trial - 21st October

When the first rider leaves the start field at Feldon near Marske at 9am it will be the 70th running of the SCOTT, reputed to be the toughest test of motorcycle riding in this country.

The trial was first started in 1914 by Alfred Scott who wished to test his employees and the Scott machines that they produced at Shipley. The first venue for the event was in Upper Wharfedale.

In 1938 he Middlesbrough and Stockton Motor Clubs started to run The Scott in the Cleveland area, but in 1939 the war came and motorcycles were put away until 1946 when the trial resumed at Swainby.

In 1950 the trial moved into this area organised by the Darlington Motor Club who ran the trial for 40 years until 1990 when the club ran into trouble and it was looking like the end of an era.

However a few motorcycle mad enthusiasts from the Richmond Motor Club decided that the trial must go on, we got down to organising the 1991 trial, this year will be our fifth and we hope it will live up to its reputation once again.

We are ever grateful to the landowners and farmers who each year allow us to use their land, without this there would be no trial, the people who each year sponsor the awards and there are a lot of them, the advertisers in the programme and trade sponsors. Last but not least those that buy the programme and help us to support various local charities, last year we were able to distribute over £3,000 - not a bad effort for a bunch of motorcyclists.

Teddies for Tragedies.

We would like to say a big "thank you" to all those who have been knitting teddies, and making bags for them, ever since we launched the appeal last Christmas. They have spread far and wide since then - people visiting the Dales on holiday have taken the patterns home with them, and teddies have arrived here from places like Sunderland, Doncaster, Cornwall, Mansfield, Stoke-on-Trent etc. Others have taken patterns, and are now asking whether there is anywhere nearer to them which will take them.

We were given an address in Suffolk to send the completed teddies, and we have sent 8 boxes of teddies there - a total of 385 teddies and their bags. Most of those teddies have gone out to Rumania. Although we haven't sent any teddies to Suffolk for a while it certainly doesn't mean we haven't had any "teddies; or sent them away. 300 teddies went out to Rumania in August, closely followed by another 50, which also went to Rumania, but to a different area. Some of you may remember a "Songs of Praise" programme which came from Settle, and a Quaker family whose son is working in a school for blind children in Croatia. We made contact with the family, and two boxes (100 teddies) have gone out to those children in Croatia recently. Many of the children in that particular school are Bosnians, or are Muslims, and they face the prospect of being "ethnically cleansed", which means that they will be sent back to Bosnia, or, in the case of the Muslims, to Pakistan. Another 60 teddies will be starting their journey to Rumania this weekend, and

we have just sent a box of 50 teddies to Suffolk. This means that a total of 945 teddies have been sent out to various places since Christmas - an incredible effort, and, as we said at the start, a big "thank you" to everyone who has helped.

If you want something to do as the long winter evenings set in, we have still got plenty of teddy patterns, and we are very short of bags to put the teddies in. Finished bags should be 10 inches by 13 inches, with a drawstring at the top to pull them tight. If you need wool, then please let us know, as we have got plenty of spare wool. On Monday of this week the Parish Council and certain interested Electors, were addressed by an official from the Home Housing Association, on the subject of the six houses under construction on Silver Street above the workshop units.

I, for one, found this far from illuminating. There seemed to be no understandable explanation of how these houses are to be allocated and by whom. It is much to be hoped that they will provide affordable rented accommodation for young local couples whose aim is to get married, set up home and do some breeding - not that they are likely to do much of that in one bedroom.

The object of the exercise will be quite defeated if they are merely to serve as an over spill catchment area for the towns.

It seems as if they are going to be expensive - rent is high and does not include Council Tax - heating and cooking is to be by electricity and there is to be a LPG fire in case of power cuts.

For my part, I very much doubt if I qualify for one and readers may rest assured that I do not write out of sour grapes although I might, perhaps be excused if I did so, as already my outlook has been blighted by the construction of the six workshop units, constructed some two years ago. It is sad to reflect that so far only one is occupied - five lie empty.

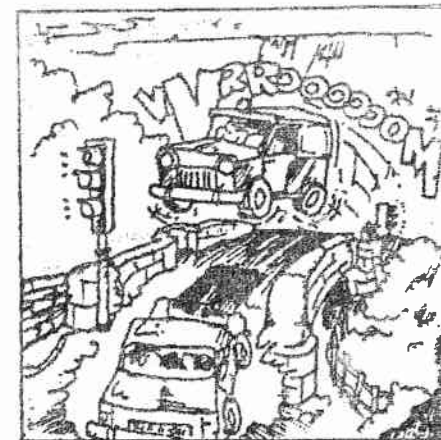
LEADERS NEEDED!
