The Christian Aid stall at Reeth Show realised £128.61p

I was interested to read that there was to be a VI Day children's party on Reeth Green, and also a peace service at St. Andrew's at



Grinton. What, I wonder, do the children imagine it is all about? I would like to share my memories of events of fifty years ago.

As one of several thousand British prisoners of war who had just returned from forced labour on the Burma/Siam railway, I was back on Singapore Island, in Ghangi, Civilians were interned in the old Changi jail and we were housed in bamboo huts around about. We were not in good shape, we were ill and week, surviving on meagre rations of rice and watery vegetable stew. We were allowed to drag up the roots of trees to use as fuel for cooking, and this exhausting activity took up much of our time.

A few brave men continued to relay news from their hidden radios, so we knew the war in Europe was over and that the Allies were making progress in Asia. All the same morale was low, we were pessimistic about our own chances of survival. We could not see how a safe release could come about in the event of a battle for Singapore.

Then on the 16th of August the news was passed around the camp that an Atom bomb had been dropped, devastating the city of Hiroshima. We had no idea what an Atom bomb was, only that it was something new and extremely powerful. We had mixed feelings of incomprehension, horror, relief. We were ordered by our own senior officers to behave as though we had heard nothing and waited in apprehension, not knowing how the

local Japanese would respond. Then as the days passed we suddenly realised that our Japanese guards were fewer, until they

finally had all disappeared and we heard of the Japanese capitulation.

Far from having the gates of our prison flung open, we were once again ordered by our own officers to remain within the wires and to be calm, mainly for our own safety as we knew little of what was happening much beyond our camp. I have recollections of sitting under the palm trees waiting and waiting, day after day, for some sign of freedom! A few days later a plane appeared in the sky and circling above us it dropped supplies and provisions.

We sat about and were 'entertained' by recordings of Winston Church's wartime speeches. I vividly remember my neck-hairs rising as I heard that voice for the first time... 'Blood sweat and tears...' 'We will fight them on the beaches...'

Then a flurry of excitement in the camp. Lady Louis Mountbatten arrived and made a tour of the place with her staff officers. What she made of this pathetic army of skeletons still clinging to the remnants of clothing we were captured in four years previously, is hard to imagine!

Finally after several more weeks of waiting troopships appeared to take us away. I think I was on the fifth ship, but my memory of how I went to Singapore Port, or indeed the rest of the journey home, is very vague. I do recall arriving at Colombo, in Ceylon, where Lord Louis had mustered dozens of young ladies (European)

dressed in white, to cheer us ashore. Socialising was strictly supervised, and we were only allowed off the ship very briefly!

The most emotional moment for most of us was when we steamed up the Solent in the mist, suddenly it lifted to reveal the Isle of Wight, dazzling in autumn light. What a contrast to the heavy greens of Malaya. It was most moving, and many of us wept.

In Southampton, to our amazement, we were welcomed like conquering heroes! Years of brain-washing by the Japanese had convinced us that we would be disgraced in the eyes of many for our ignominious defeat. We were given a cursory medical check, (no counselling or psychological help in those days to make the adjustment to the frightening early days of freedom!) and off we went with our new Demob suits hanging about us, and a chit to say we were entitled to an extra pint of milk a day!

And so to face the terrors of the public telephone, negotiation of London traffic, and all the complications involved in caring for our own futures after four years of doing only what we were told!

The popular disco concluded what must be one of the best shows for many years, a just reward for the hard work of the committee and their many helpers.

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Crime statistics for the Reeth Beat in August

Burglary -Two walk in burglaries, one business one household, make sure doors are locked even during the day and when in.

Theft of Vehicles -Two stolen 4x4's in the area (Fremington and Walburn), thieves bypassed alarms and imobilisers. If you own a 4x4 or any vehicle make it as hard as possible for thieves to steal it. The biggest problem are thefts from unattended vehicles. mostly from visitors parking in remote areas and leaving valuables in the car whilst walking; don't bring unnecessary valuables with you and leave them in the car, even the boot is not always safe. 5 cars in the area were broken into in August. Look out for and report sighting immediately (Telephone 884222) Red Vauxhall Cavalier Reg JNK 687Y, Bishop Aukland number, highly suspected as being used by burglars in our area.

BONFIRE

For the annual Bonfire on Reeth Green the Parish Council has agreed to organise a proper Fireworks Display. This event will take place at 7pm on Saturday 4th of November. The adhoc letting off of fireworks around the Green is to be discouraged.

Support is already growing for this idea and some fund raising is being organised. Obviously fireworks are expensive and we will have some proper display fireworks to make it a worthwhile and memorable display.

A small organising committee is being convened and the display will run in liaison with the Reeth Fire Service. The display will also be a fund raising event for the Fire Services National Benevolent Fund. Donations for the display can be deposited at Reeth Post Office.

In organising such a display safety for all will be paramount. The next issue will feature full details of the event, but in the meantime we are pleased to have your opinions and offers of help. We aim to make the display as spectacular as possible within a limited budget.

A final word on the Bonfire, which despite rumour contrary is being positively encouraged. Please no rubbish etc on the Green until after details are published in our October issue.

REETH PLAYGROUND FUND

The grant aid has finally been approved, we are now awaiting confirmation of when the funds become available.

PARISH COUNCIL

The use of land at the rear of the Reeth Dales Centre as a temporary car park over the Bank Holiday weekend has proved very beneficial and clearly identifies an urgent need for a permanent car park in Reeth. The support of the Rural Development Commission was very much appreciated and the council will be seeking longer term use for the next season.

Highway Matters; The council is still awaiting the Highways to complete the promised white lining on the High Row and the erection of the signs to the Doctors Surgery. The council is to press for a site meeting to seek alterations to certain waiting particularly restrictions Arkengarthdale Road, Silver Street opposite the fire station and on the High Green. Whilst the Council is aware of local concerns on which they are happy to act, the Chairman stressed that letters to the Clerk, not individual Councillors, do very much strengthen the Council's case when making representations to various bodies and especially the County Highways.

Improvements to the Quaker Close Bungalows; The Chairman said that he had discussed the problems with Richmondshire District Council and was pleased report that the Clerk of Works is on site daily and the work is now ahead of schedule.

VJ Day; The events and celebrations had proved popular and it was agreed to send a letter of appreciation to William McCleary and his supporters.

Market Bus; The support of the Market Bus was disappointing and appreciation was expressed to Malcolm Terry and Harkers Coaches for their support in this venture. The Council is still to seek a meeting with the Royal Mail about the possibility of a Post Bus and the Rural Transport issue will remain on the agenda.

Reeth Market; Is still proving popular and twelve stall holders attended for the extra market on Bank Holiday Monday. They reported brisk trade but thoughts from local traders need to be sought.

Bonfire: See feature

Mower; The dry summer has eased the problem of the mower but it is still an item the Council needs. It was agreed to trade in the old mower and purchase a new one. A suitable model had been recommended and tested with great success. Alternative suggestions proved too costly.

Bulbs: See feature

Healaugh Square; Despite the dry weather a drain has been causing local problems. The origin of the problem has probably been caused by other agencies, but in the interim the responsibility falls on the Parish Council to dig it out and complete the necessary exploratory works. It was agreed that the work should start as soon as possible.

Audit; The Clerk Margaret Bainbridge eported on the Annual Audit.

Street Lighting; The new lighting is still causing local concerns, but the situation is being monitored. It must

be appreciated that the lighting i 'amenny lighting' and not highway lighting. With the approach of darke evenings the Council will press for the urgent completion of outstanding works, especially along the Back Larle, Mill Lane and Fremington.

Other Items; Litter and dog fouling is still a general gripe. One resident had asked for consideration of the installation of traffic lights on Reeth Bridge but it was agreed that this was not practical. On conclusion of the main business the Chairman again opened the meeting to members of the public present.

The next meeting will be at 7pm on Monday 25th September in the Memorial Hall



Housing Subsidies in the Yorkshire Dales

If a local or indeed an in-comer wanting to make his or her permanent home in the Dales, buys a house they will be entitled to a derisory amount of MIRAS relief for mortgage interest paid.

The Chancellor is under pressure from the housing lobby to increase relief for housing to boost the market. My personal view is that the market is high enough and any relief would be inflationary. The Government however keeps using the cliché 'a level playing field' (a rarity in the dales) so why is it that in-comers buying up housing stock in the dales or indeed anywhere else enjoy subsides of up to 40% or more? A taxpayer can roll over (ie delay paying) capital gains tax by buying a holiday cottage which then need only be let about 10 weeks a year, probably enough nicely to cover its overheads.

It would appear that the purchaser is then excused paying the Parish rate and may often also pay a reduced Council tax if the property is not assessed to business rate as many are not.

Why is there this one subsidised class of taxpayer who are frankly are less deserving than those who make their homes here and contribute to the community 12 months a year? They are noticeably absent when the snow needs shovelling.

As this I understand is a greater problem in Wales perhaps our local MP, who must be congratulated on his promotion to the cabinet as minister for that Principality, will whisper in the Chancellor's ear.
