

Hurst Lead Mines

The Lead Mines at Hurst are where the first lead ore, or so called galina, was worked by the ancient Britons long before the Romans took over. They built roads and mined underground to get to the rich veins of ore, and the Smelting Mills. Queens Level was the main drift with branches over the whole area.

The London Lead Company later took over. They closed down in 1890. Up to then Hurst was a very prosperous hamlet supporting a school, a pub called "The Green Dragon" which stands to this day in all its glory. Hurst to day is a ruin from the saving, "It was the last place God made and forgot to finish it." It has a Methodist Chapel and many houses have been built. It is surrounded by grouse moors and heather. There is a great tourist attraction, two chimneys towering at the head of Hurst. They were air shafts to Queens Level. Then there was a Prize Level which worked to get the under set veins. It was a mile under ground with a shaft down 100 feet which flooded and stopped all workings. The Green Dragon used to have a quoits pitch when the landlord, Charles Atkinson, was licensee.

Ben Hall and Arkengarthdale miner worked in Queens level when it closed down in 1890. The Hodson brothers of Roan Gill Hurst worked, in Prize Level. Cart Shaft at Hurst Head with its engines brought the ore to the surface at Hurst with the once famous "Green Dragon" and its bistoric lead mines will in future become a tourist dream



The Key Stage I shield was won by Amy Stubbs and the Key Stage II cup by Charlotte Stubbs. James Birks won the Art shield and the football trophy. Christopher Harker won the football medal and a special caterers Award was presented to out dinner lady Hilda Harker. The leavers gave presents to Mrs Lundberg and Mrs Bumby.



THE ENCHANTED LAND Part I Grinton to Ellerton

Surely the ten miles from Grinton to Richmond must be the most beautiful stretch of road in all England. Where else would you pass, in quick succession, the marvelously picturesque ruins of not one but two priories, one Benedictine, the other Cistercian?

You are skimming along beside the exciting River Swale too, and it is bordered by deep woods such as Stainton, Scar Spring, Side Bank and Kirkgate and Hag Wood (some of them owned by the National Trust). From the edges of some of these woods you will often see little roe deer gazing unconcernedly out at passing traffic. Lonce knew a motorist who used to swerve wildly from side to side of this road, lost in wonder at all its marvels, and who sometimes had to be rescued from ditches and various other awkward predicaments. You don't need to risk this, though, for you and I are going to see it all, here and now, by proxy, as it were.

Mind you, it's all very well for me to talk airily about "skimming along", for you only have to pick up your Baddeley's Guide to Yorkshire, Part II, 1909, and turn to page 83. Here you read as follows: "There are two roads from Richmond to Reeth. The old hill road is a cattle-track and the lower (main) road badly needs repairing. There is no public conveyance up the Dale and the road over the Buttertubs is a mountain pass..."

Long after the Ice Age Swaledale was filled with lakes formed by natural dams, or moraines, across the Dale, and there is a local tradition that the Romans came into the Dale by boat. These lakes must have been known to prehistoric man, and even now after stormy weather the floor of the Dale is covered with water from side to side, to such an extent that you could talk about Grinton-on-Sea without getting too much of a pimple on your tongue.

The main reason for the Grinton-on-Sea

effect hereabouts is the junction of the Arkle Beck with the River Swale just above the Church. It always reminds me of the meeting, after a thousand miles or so, of the Blue and White Nile at a place called Halfaya, upstream from Khartoum - dashed impressive, I can tell you - and whereas the colours of the Swale and Arkle Beck are a rather jolly whisky colour, blending nicely together, the Blue Nile is more of a brownish green and the White Nile looks like cocoa with a lot of milk in it - and they don't mix together for several miles downstream. So let us be thankful for the whisky hereabouts, what? - even if it is only water!

The flood-water at Grinton Bridge takes an hour to reach Richmond, where an automatic flood warning system now replaces the old-fashioned one, by which the Richmond Police were alerted by telephone - and you could imagine a large policeman galumping up and down the river bank in heavy boots, waving a red flag and shouting "Danger! Danger! Don't go in the river or you'll be carried off!"

The high waters have been known to flood the Church There was once a Churchwarden here who, they say, used to fish for trout in the North Aisle during flood-time. He would stand in the pulpit and cast a fine line down between the pews where the trout were ... (you can believe that one or not, as you please).

Well well - so let us start, then, at Grinton. The Church of St. Andrew is a vast one - 460 seats (as Churchwarden of Grinton for 18 years up to 1978 I got to know these things) and all of them filled for the funeral of a local farmer, as, for example Sep Barningham of Marrick.

The Church interior is of exceptional interest. (I used to take tourists parties round on a little trot up and down, pointing out various items which I thought might be

worth a word or two). Here, for instance, is a heavy but beautiful carved wooden canopy, suspended over the font in the 15th century by a chain from the roof. In Catholic England it sat heavily on top of the font to prevent country folk from stealing the water inside, which was consecrated once a year in a special Consecration service and was therefore, to them, holy water and a powerful healer. A little bottlefull would cure dashed nearly anything. they reckoned, from corns to splitting headaches - and who shall say there wasn't a good deal of faith-healing in it all? There were, after all, plenty of holy wells not far away, such as St. Alkelda's in Middleham, St. Simon's in Coverdale, St. Mary's near Thornton Rust, to name but a few.

Then there is the chancel screen made in the 15th century to screen off the chancel, i.e., that part of the church nearest the alter which was the private domain of the priest, from the nave, where the congregation could move around (no pews in early times). But this screen is specialit has a cresting made of iron, although it has some dark brownish colour as the rest of the wooden screen. So when you tap it sharply with, say, a toffee hammer, it gives off a loud clang, causing a great sensation among the visitors!

Elsie Pedley was the organist here for a stretch of nearly seventy years, having started when she was only 13 years old. We presented her with a gold watch on her 50th year, and she continued playing until she was in her 80s.

There is no continuous riverside track down the Dale below Reeth, so we shall just have to follow in the footsteps of the celebrated **Hop-aong- Cassidy**, and hop along from place to place, you see. before we go hopping off, though, we really must glance at one or two places in Grinton.

The **Bridge Inn**, for instance, is of ancient origin. In his English Parish Churches, 1958, p.45, John Betjeman wrote that in the 15th century each village in England was almost

a country in itself. Near the entrance to the village churchyard was the **church house**, where the churchwardens stored the beer or "church ale" for feasts. This is the origin of so many old inns being beside the churchyard in England.

Opposite the Bridge Inn, next to the church, we find **Blackburn Hall**. An underground passage is said to connect the Hall with the sanctuary in the church. Notice the chimney, dated 1635, over the fireplace in the middle of the Hall. This fireplace replaced the open fire which in medieval times was common practice, when the smoke simply went straight out through a hole in the roof. (Homesteads of the Yorkshire Dales, James Walton, 1947, pp.56-58). As a result of this constant exposure to the smoke everybody looked a little darker, if not blacker, than they do in these hygienis day!

Then what about **Neddy's House**, a few steps up the hill just above the road turning off to Harkerside? It has a full set of mullioned windows of the 17th century, but look at the chimney. A carved inscription is still visible: "1665. God Save The King". What king? Charles II. His Restoration of 1660, or rather, the news of it, may have taken a long time to filter down, what? And look at the letters "N" & "G" carved sideways by a rustic hand!

On the other side of the road is another old house, dated "1716" over the door, and up the hill we see **Grinton Manor**, with a sad little inscription near the front door: "HELP LORD FOR VAINE IS THE HELPE OF MEN RO. HILERY 1670" - it may be "1610" - sure which. So what went wrong? The money dried up, perhaps? Or his assistant ran off. We shall never know.

Higher up still stands Grinton Lodge, grandly situated on a spur giving a magnificent and highly scenic view of Middle Swaledale where it is joined by Arkengarthdale, just above Reeth. "Grinton Lodge was purchased as a shooting lodge, together with the manor of Grinton, by

J.C.D. Charlesworth, of Chapelthorpe Hall Wakefield, from Godfrey Wentworth, of Wooley Park, Wakefield, on 18th May 1855. The Wentworths had been in financial straits ever since the collapse of the bank of Wentworth, Chaloner & Rishworth in 1825..." (Letter from Mr. John Goodchild, Curator of Cusworth Hall Museum, Doncaster, 29th May, 19970). A visitor once said to me: "I never realised that Grinton actually had a castle!" Well, it does look like a castle, complete with Keep, Turrets and battlement walls, having been built in the early 19th century when follies were all the rage.

But come! We must **hop off**, down to the elegant mid-Georgian Cogden Hall, built c.1750 by John Readshaw of Richmond and purchased in 1802 by Christopher & Matthew Whitelock of Ellerton, in whose family it remained until recent times. (We have a portrait of one of them adorning the staircase in our house at High Fremington).

Down here you find, in the fields alongside the river, little clumps of marsh marigolds, a dashed interesting and beautiful plant - "shining, sun-like, golden flowers opening while the year is still cold and lasting into May, it was growing in England before the Ice Age". ("The Englishman's Flora", G.Grigson, 1975, p.33). Perhaps the dinosaurs trod them under their large feet? Shakespeare called them "Mary-buds", and has a song about them in Cymbeline (Act 2 Scene 3). It's the kind of song you might sing to your wife when you bring her up a morning cup of tea - (on the other hand, perhaps not):

"Hark, Hark, the lark at Heaven's gate sings,


And Phoebus 'gins arise,
His steeds to water at those springs
On chalic'd flowers that lies;
And winking mary-buds begin
To ope their golden eyes..."

On the right-hand side of the road.i.e., on the same side as Cogden Hall, many of the level greens of what use to be a **9-hole golf** course. Indeed some of them look smooth enough for a spot of putting practice even now! However, the Grinton Golf Course disappeared when Grinton Manor had to be sold off to pay for the double death duties incurred by the Charlesworths, as a tragic result of the last war when both father and son lost their lives in quick succession.

If you are motoring to Richmond you might care to become a traffic hazard and cast a few glances to your **right**, to see how many level putting greens are still visible. on the 9-holer. (I thought I could spot 5, but at that time I was walking to Catterick at 5 in the morning, so was not much of a traffic hazard).

At this point we are crossing the eastern most boundary of the ancient Parish of Grinton, which stretched to the North Riding border and was the second largest in North Yorkshire, only Aysgarth exceeding it in area. The boundary here was marked by a wicket-gate called Stolerston Stile on the map, though it has now disappeared. On the Richmond side of this boundary line, marked by a succession of boundary stones. lies Effection Parish, owned since the early 17th century by the Drax family (whose name, by the way, has blossomed over the centuries into a four-barrelled job -Plunkett-Ernle-Erle-Drax!) Many of the boundary stones are carved with the initials "E.D." and "E.E.D.", culminating on the Wensleydale border with the king-pin of them all, the Snowden Man (at least it has a crown, or rather a coronet above the initial "B" for Lord Bolton, with the initials "E.E.D." below).

You get a good view of Marrick Priory from the road here, with its tower for the Priory Church of St. Andrew used by the Prioress and her 12 Benedictine nuns - they in the choir screened off from the hoi-polloi (i.e., the likes of you and me) in the nave. JMW Turner painted it from nearer the river in the early 19th century. He called it "Marrick Abbey" and surrounded it with mountain peaks soaring a few thousand feet



into the clouds - as was his wont.

Right up to the early 1880s, though, our view of Marrick Priory from the road would no doubt have been blocked by the Ellerton Smelt Mill. Dr. A. Raistrick, in his "Smelt Mills of Swaledale", 1976, p.33, mentions "the massive and extensive foundations (of Ellerton Smelt Mill) on the South side of the river opposite Marrick Priory... it was smelting until about 1883, when ore was being taken from the Drax mines on Ellerton Moor. During its last period of activity (p.34) the mines were being worked from a few shafts and from a deeper level in Hag Gill". On either side of our road the spoil heaps of this last mining activity dominate the scene even now. Notice "Hags Gill Cottage" at this point. It was, in fact, a Toll House on the Reeth-Richmond turnpike in former times, and you can still see a small part of what was the gate-post for the gate which would have stood across the road here.

Wood House Farm (Robt Bainbridge) can also be seen across the river, set against Steps Wood and Nagshaw Wood. (Steps Wood? Yes, named after the 375? said to be, but I must say I have never completed a count) built for the nuns of the Priory to give them access to the mining village of Marrick above.

John Metcalfe and wife Shirley who also farmed at Marrick once told me how he had attended his father's funeral procession to the Priory Church down the Nagshaw Bank track, then, as now, the only access for wheeled traffic, i.e., the funeral hearse, which, with its four black plumes, one at each corner, was kept in a stone shed at the —Priory until recent years (and is now said to be in the Beamish Museum at Chesterle-Street).

Marrick Stepping Stones across the river are still to be seen a little downstream from the ford. They were probably used by the nuns of the two Priories, Marrick & Ellerton, on the opposite sides of the river. There used to be a boat here, attached to a

rope for ferrying yourself across. Hazel Bainbridge from Wood House Farm used to come this way while working in Richmond: She would walk up Mill Hills Lane to catch the bus, thus saving herself a long walk to Fremington to catch the same bus there!

In the hedge opposite where Mill Hills Lane comes out on to the main road there grows a gooseberry tree, about 12 feet high, usually with a heavy crop of large dark yellow gooseberries - enough for perhaps four pounds of jam.

Old Roland Woodward of Fremington Farm said to me on a day in January 1968: "They say Swaledale people are mad, and so we are. There are **two** different places called Crackpot, there's a farm called Dirty Spot, and there's even a field with 14 corners!" This field lies just below Marrick Old Vicarage.

At Marrick Old Vicarage one of the last Vicars of Marrick, the Reverend John Wharton Mason, lived from 1846 for over 50 years. In his later years he found the walk to services at Marrick Church increasingly difficult. So on Sunday mornings he used to send his son down to the church, with instructions to ring the bell if there were any congregation. If all was silent it meant that no one had turned up at church and the old man could turn over and go to sleep again!

So what ho! Here we are, quite suddenly in sight of Ellerton Abbov, the great house of the Draxes, built in 1830 from the remains of the Cistercian Priory During work on the foundations, in 1827, three stone coffin lids were found, one of which is inscribed "HICIACET WIMERUS P'SONA". Wimerus, son of the lord of Aske, was the founder of the Priory in the reign of Henry II (1154-89), as indicated by H. Speight in "Romantic Richmondshire", 1897, p.219. The Cistercian nuns had a College Close (or Nun's Close) in Richmond as a training school for the Nunnery. ("Swaledale", E.Pontefract & M.Hartley, 1946, p.132). The other two coffin lids belong to two of the Prioresses, "PETRONILE PRIORISE" (Petronilla the Prioress died in 1251), and Ellen, another Prioress, who died in 1268. These three slabs lie alongside the ruined walls of the Priory, half-hidden in grass and nettles.

Although Ellerton Priory seems more exposed than others the surrounding country was once forest land and the Priory would have been as secluded as Marrick. This did not prevent the Scots from pillaging the place after Bannockburn (1314), when most of the records were destroyed.

High above Stainton Wood the boundary of Ellerton runs, coming down to the river at the point where Stainton Lame branches off the main Richmond road - and there, at the edge of Stainton Moor on the skyline, we see the conspicuous landmark known as the Ellerton Ship, a clump of trees blown sideways by the prevailing westerly winds. It does indeed look like a four-masted sailing ship on the skyline.

So let us perform our last hop, inspired by the great Hopalong C. himself, and make our landing on the Ellerton Ship. The grass is lawn-like underneath these dramatically slanting trees (conifers of sorts) and the tremendous view uplifting. The whole of Swaledale seems to be spread beneath our feet, from the herd of cows loading grass into themselves just below at Ellerton Abbey Farm (M. Barker) to the far-off Reeth and the Upper Dale fading into the blue distance. It is a sight never to be forgotten.




