



SWALEDALE MEMORIES

The Monday evening slide shows at Fremington Sunday School have been running for ten years now, and are an established part of the *Swaledale Festival*, though they extend well beyond it. Originally provided to meet the cost of the Grinton Church roof, the proceeds from the enterprise, which often attracts full houses, are now shared with local charities.

Inevitably, the themes of the shows, which are all related to the Dales in their many aspects, appeal especially to men and women who are returning to the land of their birth, and in my case the evocative and delightful talk by Marjorie Daniels on "A Year in the Dale" brought back many memories. To begin with, the Sunday School itself reminded me not, only of the weekly struggle of my older sister to keep control of an unruly group on Sunday afternoons, but also of the plays which were performed in which everyone had to participate. I particularly recall the masterly characterisation of Scrooge given by one of my brothers in Dicken's Christmas Carol - so well done that it gained him an undeserved reputation for what would now be called typecasting. My other brothers, as Ghosts of Christmas Past and Present had an altogether easier time.

But it is the picture of the moors, and the purple heather, which really tug the heartstrings. From an early age my brothers had regarded August 12th as a red letter day, and I was no exception. When I reached the age of eleven, I let the gamekeeper know that I was available, and confirmed that I would be paid the same wage as the men - seven shillings a day, which was a small fortune to me. On a visit to Healaugh recently, I looked across Horsepasture Wood, which was the furthest point on Day one, from where we followed the wall over the hill to the starting point of the first drive. The walk to the farthest points was always something of a gamble. The assistant gamekeeper led the crocodile, and every so often stopped and called out to us to stay there. The rest carried on, and, one by one were dropped off so that there was a fanlike drive which would close in on the butts. The question was, was it better to be close to him, so that you were in his mind (may be talking to him on some subject but not so interesting that he would want to continue the conversation to the end.) Or to lag behind, showing the very real signs of weariness which would attract his sympathy? I never found out the answer - or even if there was one. I still remember the gamekeeper's words which he used to tell me that my turn had come - "Thou (pronounced 'thoo') stop that, Frank." I have left instructions for it to be added to my gravestone when the time comes! When the guns were in place, eventually the shout would go up and we were on our way, most of us waving our white flags in a sturdy display of intent - though I do recall one farmer who put his flag over his shoulder, smoked his pipe, and simply walked on without a single wave. He never seemed to warrant a reprimand.

On particular incident has always stayed with me. Just as we were reaching the butts, a fox which had been disturbed from it lair, ran the whole way down in front of the butts, and not a single one of the shooters tried to shoot it. The gamekeeper was livid, because foxes were constantly responsible for depleting the number of grouse available for the shoot; but of course, the gentlemen were also huntsmen, and that was an early lesson to me on the problem of conflicts of interest.

The moors were also the scene of a game which I have not heard of anywhere else, known as "Fox-Off." I was too young to participate in it alongside my brothers, and by the time I was, the number of youths in the village were so small as to make it impossible. It was an adaptation of the paperchase, but it took place on moonlight nights over the moors above Grinton Church, with the foxes (two running together) having a couple of minutes start and letting out howls, and the hounds would shout into the night, "Shout of the hounds won't follow." If the foxes arrived back in the village ahead of the hounds, then they had won, but the contest resumed next night when the moon made it a healthy adventure. Sprained ankles were a real hazard, and the ability to avoid them was a main contributor to success in this exciting game. I always felt that I had missed out in not taking part, and that the local grammar school's cross country runs were but a poor sanitised version.

But of course, there were less pleasant occasions. I shall never forget the sound of a horse and cart on the cobbles in front of our house, on its way next door, where it delivered the breadwinner. His back had been broken by a fall of stone in the local quarry, and he was in agony, dying the next day. There was, of course, no question of getting an ambulance, or of taking him to hospital - it was difficult enough to find the doctor to administer such painkilling drugs as he had. I was only seven years old at the time, but even after all these years, I know that it was then that my determination to fight for the establishment of a National health Service was born.

At one examination, at degree level, he took three papers, I recall. Got ninety-nine per cent in each of them. Came out top. Back home with these results, justly proud you might think of his achievement, all he got from Annie our mother, bless her, was "Och aye, laddie, but whur did you lose the three marks?" That saddened brother Thomas and it made me sad too - but Annie never did learn that the best was the enemy of the good.


Community Wall Hanging

Remember us? Yes we are still ambling along completing "The Nidderdale Way" last year with no major incidents apart from the first night when the pub landlord exclaimed "Oh No!" I told you not to come to Patley Bridge Showday - no room at the Inn." We did think "It's under the hedge tonight girls" but he relented and we were back on course. Although not included in the national Park it is an area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and includes reservoirs, How Steam Gorge and Brimham Rocks and of course the attractive River Nidd with its woodland and moors. Next came "Lady Annes Way" a 100 mile walk from Skipton Castle to Brougham Castle, following the route that Lady Anne Clifford took on her journeys inspecting her castles and churches. Beautiful scenery all the way - a slight argument at the start of the walk "Who was going to be Lady Anne and carried in a litter." But that was dispensed with no-one wanted to Ladies in Waiting! We visited castles and churches along the way and had lovely weather apart from a heavy shower near Lammerside Castle - where we sheltered and had twenty minutes hymn singiming until the rain stopped. We inspected the Alms Houses at Appleby which Lady Anne had built. Permission was given by "The Mother" to enter the courtyard and chapel. The incident had a very sobbering effect on the company and we were extra careful, despite the fact it would take an extra strong gust to blow some of us over. There are compensations at being overweight.

We do enjoy each other's company, never short of a topic to discuss, and the interesting and varied 'B & B's' we give marks to out of 10. History of Tan Hill - England's Highest Inn

It is situated on the fells of Swaledale and Arkengarthdale. Going Back the Jaggar Road was a hiding place for Highwaymen. For Dick Turpin a place to rest his horse after being followed from York up the Old Jagger Road which runs past Tan Hill. The coal mines at Tan Hill date back to the 12th Century. At that time it was called a Beer House and several miners cottages were occupied. At the tune of the century it was closed as there was no tenants. Till George and Jim Harker and Trot Metcalfe took over the coal pit and installed Mrs Susan Peacock as licensee of Tan Hill. She lived there till her death and it has changed hands many times since. In its hey day, 1920 to 1030, before motor transport, horse and carts were waiting outside the Inn for their half ton loads a four pence a hundred weight. Before that time coal was jagged on mules and horses No tramps or vagabond dared step out of place when Susan Peacock said, "Get going.". She always kept a revolver handy and she could shoot straight! Tan Hill has seen many hard winters; cut off for many weeks - 1947 January to March. Tan Hill Sheep Show is one of the best sites to see you wonder where all the people come from. It must be the pure air one traveller once said "You never die of a living up here." The landlord replied only once. Tan Hill was raided by the police August Bank Holiday Sunday 1959, although there was many holiday-makers in at the time. It made history and trade improved. Many people had come a long way and had found and refreshments. some even singing, "Beautiful Swaledale land of rest. How much do I love thee"

Tan Hill has now been modernised to cope with the tourist trade. The miners cottages have gone, but the old Inn still stands in all its glory



REETH is an extensive township containing 5,659 acres, of which, 2,784 are moorland, and includes the town of Reeth, and the hamlets of Fremington and Healaugh. The hills abound in lead ore, and the mines give employment to a considerable number of the inhabitants. The present rateable value of the township is £4,449, and the population in 1881 was 998. The principal landowners are Capt. F. H. Lyell, Mr. John Barker, Reeth; John Tomlin, Esq., Burlington Street, Kensington, London; Mr. John Sherlock, Scarborough; Mr. Matthew Whitelock; Dr. A. B. Kernot, Reeth; G. W. Robinson, Esq., Reeth; Mrs. M. Robinson; Mr. James Littlefair, Gaythorne Hall, Westmoreland; Mrs. Winn, Askrigg; Mrs. Metcalfe, Hawes; and Mr. Henry Deacon, Reeth.

This place is thus mentioned in Domesday Book: "In Rie there are six carucates rateable to the geld, and there may have been three ploughs. Tor had a manor there, now Bodin has it and it is waste." In the time of the Edwards the manor was held by the Marleys and Gants. Later, it came to the Bigods, but was lost to this family by the attainder and execution of Sir Francis Bigod, for his participation in the Pilgrimage of Grace. It afterwards came into the possession of the Lords Wharton, and was confiscated with other manors and estates on the attainder of Philip, Duke of Wharton, in 1728. It subsequently passed through several hands to the late Thomas Smith, Esq., of Muker Hall, whose daughter and co-heir, Frances, married Charles Lyell, Esq., from whom it has descended to the present owner.

The town of Reeth is picturesquely seated on an eminence near the confluence of the Arkle and the Swale, eight miles N.W. of Leyburn, and 10 miles W. of Richmond. Philip, Lord Wharton, in the reign of William and Mary, obtained a charter for a weekly market and four annual fairs. The market is still held on

Friday, but is now of scarcely any importance; and the fairs, under an arrangement made in 1856, are held on the Friday before the first Monday in March, the first Friday in May, the Friday before Masham lamb fair, and the last Friday in October. The Congregationalists have been established here since 1787. The present edifice was built in 1868, at a cost of about £1,000, which was raised by subscription. It is in the Gothic style, and will seat 400 persons. In the rear are a Sunday school and a small burial ground. The Wesleyan chapel was erected in 1796, and in May, 1887, it was considerably damaged by a fire that broke out in the early hours of the morning. It has since been restored and improved, at an outlay of £500, and will accommodate 500 people. It is under the pastorate of the Rev. Thomas Peers. The Friends' Endowed School was founded in 1778 by Messrs. Raw, and endowed with £2,195 2s. 6d., which has since been increased to £4,000. The present school, with master's house attached, was erected in 1862, at a cost of £3,000. There is accommodation for 400 children, and an average attendance of 120. It is open to all denominations. In consideration of the endowment, 30 boys and 20 girls are taught gratuitously. Mr. John Robinson is the master. A Mechanics' Institute was established in 1878, and now contains 1,090 volumes.

Reeth Poor Law Union comprises the townships of Arkingarthdale, Ellerton Abbey, Grinton, Marrick, Melbecks, Muker, and Reeth, covering an area of 70,267 acres, and had, in 1881, a population of 4,718. The rateable value of all the land property within the Union is £28,699, a depreciation of £8,232 since the previous valuation. The Workhouse is situated on the south side of the town, and has accommodation for 34 paupers; present number of inmates, 18.

Fremington is a small village and manor in this township, about half a mile east of Reeth. A Free School, in connection with the Established Church, was founded here in 1643, by James Hutchinson, a merchant and alderman of York, but a native of this place. He endowed it with lands at Gate Fulford and Fremington. The school is mixed, and has an average attendance of 68.

Fremington is mentioned in Domesday Book, and at that time Alan, Earl of Richmond, had the manor, which then lay waste. It afterwards came into the possession of the Gants, of Swaledale, and, at a later period, belonged to the Covells, of Ainderby Myers, one of whom sold it, in the reign of Elizabeth, to Thomas Layton, Esq. The next owners were the Whartons, of Gillingwood, from whom the estate was purchased by Peter Denys, in 1796, or soon after, from whom it has descended to Sir Francis Charles Edward Denys, Bart.

Draycott Hall, the seat of Sir Francis, is pleasantly situated at the foot of a steep hill, half a mile from Reeth. The house is at present held on a lease by

W. S. Deacon, Esq., who resides here during the shooting season.

Healaugh, or Helah (Hale in Domesday Book) is another village about 11 miles S.W. of Reeth. It was once a place of much more importance, and the head of the manor, which included Reeth, Melbecks, and Muker, comprising about 40,000 acres. The manor, early in the 13th century, came into the possession of the Gants, lords of all Swaledale; and the mansion-which tradition says stood in the Hall Garth, and belonged to the renowned John of Gaunt-was more probably the residence of this family, between whom and the famous Duke of Lancaster there was only a very remote kinship. From the Gants a moiety of the manor passed to Peter de Malolacu, as co-heir to Gilbert de Gant, his maternal uncle, who died in 1297. This moiety was purchased in 1385 by Robert de Plesyngton, and the other passed, by the marriage of an heiress, to the Bigods. The manor descended in severalties through various families, and eventually came into the possession of the Whartons, and now belongs to Captain Francis Horner Lyell. The owners of the royalties are Sir F. C. E. Denys, Bart., Sir F. F. D. Shuckburgh, Bart., and the Countess of Pomfret. The Wesleyans have a chapel in the village.

This township is in the Wapentake and Petty Sessional Division of Gilling

West.
