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

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

GRINTON PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Parking Following a site meeting, proposals have been drawn up by the Highways Department to introduce yellow lines on certain roads near the village centre in order to relieve congestion. After due consideration, in some detail, Councillors have agreed to support the scheme.

Rights Of way A meeting has been requested with the Definitive Map Officer to discuss the current redraing of the map of footpaths and rights of way within the national park, with a view to correcting certain anomalies and errors which were included in earlier maps. The national park Authority is opposing the use of green lanes by excessive off road traffic.

Swale Regeneration Project Councillors have expressed their regrets at the departure of Mr. Simon Lovell, the project manager, who has recently left to take up a post in Cumbria. His work with the local community over recent years has been much appreciated.

Millennium grants are still being pursued to fund millennium projects. Work on producing a photographic archive of the Parish is underway, and all residents will be contacted concerning the details when confirmation has been received fro the photographer.

Footpath To Cemetery Letters have been received in support of the footpath scheme and a reduced quote has been obtained from NYCC. It is not yet known if millennium funding will be available as the decision on allocation of grants has been deferred until December. Other sources of funding are also being looked into.

Stepping Stones the stepping stones at Healaugh have now been reinstated for the first time since they were washed away in a storm 100 years ago.

School Governors Members have agreed to support Councillor Sunter as nominee to the Board of Governors of Reeth Community School.

Parish Forum Discussion had included the future provision of local accident and emergency facilities following the closure of the military hospital at Catterick. Here had been no representative from the Highways department present to answer concerns raised at the meeting, but an undertaking had been given that someone from the department would visit the area to see the problems at first hand.

Internal Auditor in line with the new requirements Dr. Elizabeth Sutherland has agreed to act as an internal auditor to the coulncil. Commemorative Seat A possible site for Mr.Ellis's seat has been identified on the Harkerside road near Scar House

Library Coucillors were concerned at the District Council's proposed reexamination of library facilities in rural areas, fearing that this could involve further reductions in the service.

Parish Hall It was reported that the bulk of the inside work would be completed and the hall would be back inu se very shortly.

Bus Shelter The shelter in Grinton would be inspected and repaired. Public Transport Councillors completed a questionaire for the NYCC Local Transport Plan identifying items of local concern.

MUKER CENTENARY - Muker Slver Band

The release of Muker Silver Band's new video – Muker Centenary is a timely occurrence for Christmas! This video is a celebration of the 'Swaledale Village and its famous Silver Band.'

The video is really an opportunity to see some superb views of the Dale. as well as showing the band in rehearsals and performances during its Centenary Year in 1997. Special events during the Band's Centenary Year are recorded, and we also some of the individual band members in their everyday lives. There is some fascinating archive footage (look out for some senior members in their youth!) and a very good soundtrack provided of course by that famous "village Silver Band". The soundtrack is taken from some of their best recordings. The commentary, written and narrated by Dr. Duncan Bythell, who has played an important part in music in Swaledale over the last fifteen years or so, is used well to enhance the whole production. Of course the music is of a traditional Brass Band programme. There are marches, hymn tunes, selections and popular songs (even by Lloyd Weber, and Dr. Bythell is known for his reticence in playing that particular composers tunes!) Dr. Bythell has written an excellent history on Muker Silver Band (recommended reading), as well as a history of another band in Lancashire, and articles on banding.

This is very good local viewing of interest to all who like and love our Dale and its traditions. Priced at £10 (11:75 incl. P & P), it makes an excellent gift for Christmas or any other occasion. It is available from :-

C₂Cllr₂ J₂ Blackie, D. Cllr O₃ Kendall and Ms₂ D₃ McDermott and Mr₄ S₄ Petre from Richmondshire RDC attended the meeting on 18th, November,

The meeting opened with the chair asking for a minutes silence in memory of Mr. George Graham who died on Nov 8th. He served for many years as Councillor and Chair of Marrick Parish Council. After that items discussed were:

<u>Sewage Problems at Marrick</u> – an outline of the history of the investigations by RDC over the last to years was given, along with a progress report.

Millennium Project -tree planting at High Busca. The area had been selected. Tree planting day will be January 2nd, 2000,

Standing Orders -these were formally adopted and signed by the Chair.

Provisional local transport plan for NY. –n whereas the council agreed genrally with the plan, it was felt that more discussion was needed concerning road improvement, winter maintenance, high cost of fuel and rural bus service.


Mobile Library Service – the following suggestions were put: the service restored to every two weeks, a list of new titles should be available, Mobile library, more recently published titles should be available, books should be changed more often, more talking and large print books required, n evening or Saturday service to village halls wanted, a video rental service, notice board highlighting events within the area and a microfiche index required.

Footpath 0-Grinton The Council to write to Grinton PC to support the application for a footpath from the village to the cemetery.

Swaledale Parish Forum - the clerk confirmed that she had attended the forum which discussed the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme, emergency services over the holiday period, health (the local hospitals) and Roads. A report was given.

It's a Doc's Life

A column with a medical slant

Continuing with the history of the Dales Medics John Richard McCollah whom I mentioned last month is buried in Grinton churchyard, look out for his grave next time you are passing.

During his stay in Reeth, John McCollah took on a partner, an interesting chap called Dr. John Corsan.

John Corsan had been in the navy before coming to Reeth. When Gladys and Corsan Alderson, who used to live in the old police house, were still alive they showed me some documents belonging to Dr. Corsan. They were inventories of items he had to possess as a ship's surgeon. Included in the list were such instruments of torture as a "say for the head", "bullet forceps", an "apparatus for restoring suspended animation" and a "scoop for extracting balls". Fortunately Y-fronts have made this particular item a thing of the past. Like William Steadman back in the 1700's the doctors were not immune to the high infant mortality of the time, John Corsan lost his son William in August 1819 at the age of 13 months and his daughter Isabella died aged only ten days.

At one time he lived at the Laurels and practiced from the Pink House, but the major memorial to him can be seen over the lintel at Overton Lea. This house is the house with the front garden, just up from the bakery, where on the lintel you can just make out the words "Corsan, Surgeon".

In 1841 John Corsan was paid £4-10s for looking after 72 people for six months. He earned enough to be a landowner in Reeth and indeed owned the poor house.

Near the poor house is a plot of land where John Corsan planted a tree on the day his daughter Agnes was born. It grew to be a thriving tree but was cut down some years ago as it was blocking light to some houses.

John Corsan died in Reeth on 13th August 1847 aged 55. His wife, Mary Waugh outlived him to die in 1867 at the age of 72.

The 1851 census showed there were two doctors in the Dale, one at Reeth and the other at Muker. There were quite a few doctors living in the upper part of the Dale, According to Fieldhouse & Jennings History of Richmond and Swaledale a Dr. Dawson was paid £6-10s by the people of Muker for medical attention in 1783 and John Jackson was paid as surgeon the sum of £9-12s-7d. Charles Connon qualified in 1875 and practiced in Muker, as did Thomas Devey who qualified in 1886. He lived at Gildie. Thomas Harling practiced from Pretoria House in Gunnerside, he qualified in 1887 and initially lived in Muker but later went back to Blackburn.



D I G Dales Initiative Group For Attracting Resources & Services

Winter issue December 1999

DIG is a grassroots group set up to attract resources and services into Swaledale and Arkengarthdale. We are a non-profit making organisation. DIG comprises of local people who want to see positive developments taking place in our area. Local business, the farming community, young people, and two church communities are all represented within our group. Our aim is to find out which developments local people would like to see in the area and then to obtain funding for those developments. Possible developments may include: Improvements to business support, transport and leisure facilities, initiatives in training and education, and the establishment of an advice centre catering for local needs.

PROGRESS UPDATE - We are now well on the way to completing our feasibility study and up to 160 people from a wide cross-section of the community have filled in one of our questionnaires. These questionnaires were designed to allow the people of Swaledale and Arkengarthdale to tell us which developments are most needed in the area. The answers to the questionnaires are currently being collated. After collation, a consultant will prepare a report based upon the questionnaire answers. The report will be made available to the people of Swaledale and Arkengarthdale and any suggestions or objections arising from it will be carefully considered before any funding is applied for. Representatives from DIG have undertaken networking visits to other organisations. Our visit to the successful IT centre established in the community office in Hawes has given us a clearer idea of the possibilities and limitations of such a development in our own area. We have also picked up a number of useful ideas from our visit to the East Durham Partnership. Which began as a grassroots group similar to our own. They are based in Peterlee and were initially set up 10 years ago to help with the high levels of unemployment coursed by pit closures, they have since, spread their wings and now cover a wide range of activities such as gardening for the elderly, and providing an IT Bus which they take out into the community for those unable to get to their centre in Peterlee. Thanks to everyone involved in distributing the questionnaires and to all those who took the time to compete one. Thanks also to the members of the Youth Club who contributed to a very useful session, for ideas in developing the area we live in.

A Public Meeting will be held at 8pm on Thursday, 20th January at the Buck Hotel, Reeth. Everyone is welcome. The committee will be present to address any queries you may have, and reporting back findings of the questionnaires and seeking feedback from the community.

It is more than a hundred years since these lines rang out inSwaledale;1837 to be precise. This was the last occasion when 'Open your door', the first character in the Swaledale Mummers' play, uttered these words to rally an audience for their antics.

The plot is well documented – St. george fights Bold Slasher the Turkish Knight. He is mortally wounded but is miraculously brought back to life by an itinerant and irascible doctor who administers a nineteenth century version of viagra called Okum Pokum. "I have a lttle bottle in my left waistcoat pocket called Okum Pokum. Here Jack, take a little of my nip nap, put it in your snip snack, Rise up Jack and fight again!" St. George, thus revived, battles once more. The Turkish Knight is finally vanquished. Englands honour is restored and the entire cast join in song. On the eleventh of December, at the Memorial Hall here in Reeth, the Mummers' play will be re-enacted at the Christmas Ceilidh. Dance music

will be provided by 'Sunday Suits and Muddy Boots' (caller Phil Parham), a Ceilidh Band not for the feint hearted. Songs performed by the ever popular and venerable Fourum and during the evening mince pies will be distributed to the poor

and needy.

Incidently this could be one of the rare occasions when Bob Hattersley may be persuaded to perform his unique version of the Twelve Days Of Christmas. Demanding both physically and mentally, this song requires vigorous training and great stamina. Bo as been practising hard for months now; only time will tell whether his body copes with the strain for the night.

The costumes sported by the Mummers have been especially designed by Heather Ritchie and her ladies who have worked diligently for weeks now to create them. The clothes will be kept in Reeth and used every year when the play is performed.

The proceeds from the evening will be used to buy apple trees for a community orchard here in Reeth. Tickets are on sale at The Post Office, Reeth at £3:00 (or £1:50 for children) – but act with alacrity, it will be a sell out!

NB - Doctor Bond stresses that there are no plans as yet to make Okum Pokum available on prescription at The Surgery.

Sir.

The development of Information Technology Tuition for the schoolchildren attending Gunnerside school is to be supported. The project to create another community building, open for late afternoon and evening hire is another matter and will, I believe, detract from the present usage of the newly refurbished village and church halls which are already struggling to maximise the present available letting hours of all the community buildings in the dale. Information Technology Courses, from Basic to advanced instruction, either vocational or non vocational are presently provided by the Adult Education arm of Richmond School at Muker Public Hall, Low Row Institute, Reeth Memorial Hall and also in Arkengarthdale. Day and evening courses are available.

Additional New Courses are due to be announced for the New Year. These courses have been designed to:

- a) provide a wide tuition spectrum for all age ranges and also
- b) to bring the opportunity of computer knowledge training within reach of, and for, the convenience of local folk at a local venue and
- c) to utilise and help support, at a negotiated reduced fee the existing open public community buildings.

Further, an Information Technology for the Millennium Project supported by a Help the Aged Award (£9,300) is presently offering free tuition for the over 55's in connection with the Luncheon Clubs and this is a long term developing project. The new Silver Surfers Club at Reeth meet each Wednesday afternoon for hands on experience, with qualified tutors. Basic instruction and E:mail with Internet use is included. To develop the required computer classes for local children, would it not be more practical from a cost and sustainability approach, thinking of the school role (numbers now and future) for the school to make more use of Gunnerside Village Hall, even adapting a room as a useful facility for the IT tuition, at a fraction of the cost of building a new room onto the school. Also has any thought been given to how this proposed project may effect the other schools serving the two dales community.

REMEMBRANCE

The Act Of Remembrance was again marked in Swaledale and Arkengarthdale. On Remembrance Day itself, there was an Act Of Remembrance at the War Memorial, Reeth, with the two minutes silence. A good number of people were there to mark the occasion. The short Act of Remembrance was lead by John Blenkiron, and Rev. Tim Tunley. The Last Post and Reveille was beautifully played by Clr. James Kendal. Being the last such occasion of this century, there was a certain poingnancy as the notes of the Last Post and Reveille filled the village and then floated up to the hills before being gently echoed back to us.

However, in the run upto Remembrance Day, while most of the people were buying poppies and preparing to observe Remembrance Day with a two minute silence, someone with rather less sense of history, and no sense of respect, thought it would be amusing to steal the halyard from the new flagpole on Reeth Green.

Undefeated, the Royal British Legion – Swaledale Branch, still managed to fly the Union jack with pride, when everyone gathered to honour the memory of those who made the supreme sacrifice during the last two wars. To replace the halyard, and fix it securely inside the pole (to protect from further vandalism) will cost local ratepayers £120. Most of us can think of much better uses for the money than correcting the sheer stupidity and thoughtlessness of such a theft. Anyone with any knowledge of the present whereabouts of the rope please try and arrange its returen to Mr. Ralph Porter or any member of the Reeth Parish Council before any further expense is incurred.

Proposed ICT Development at Gunnerside Methodist Primary School

Miner's Coughs

In Dr. Bond's last account of the past medical provision in our Dales, (Reeth Gazette, Nov.99) he writes about official reports given by Drs. McCollah and Barker on the health of the lead miners in the last century. Reports on the general well being of the community were also recorded by the guardians of the poor of the Reeth Union'. In 1841 John Harland, a trustee, investigated the conditions of the miners in a report addressed to Sir J. Waltham Bt.. Agreeing with the doctors, he said that the prevailing diseases among miners, and also common throughout the whole community were bronchial infections and rheumatism. Responsible for this he claims was the climate and living conditions of the people. Exposure to cold and rain after leaving the close warm atmosphere of the mines as well as outside employment, were a major factor. He too mentions nine year old boys working in the mines often suffering from asthma.

Apart from the miners, women and girls were also prone to chest complaints. In his survey of the Marrick community in 1843 John Harland says that about one third of the women of the parish worked outside. They picked turnips for 8d. a day, gathered weeds forn8-10ds a day and worked in the hay fields and reaping for 10d – 2/6d per day. When not occupied in the fields many women and children worked at washing the lead ore at the mines. It seems the climate had a good deal to do with their illnesses, but he also believed housing conditions were responsible for the prevelant ill health and chest conditions in particular. Large families with twelve or thirteen children commmonly lived in only two rooms.

It seems housing varied a good deal among the different parishes. Harland comments that homes in Marrick were mostly small, ling or heather thatched, and near to the occupants work. Although dry and tolerably clean they were crowded and lacked ventilation. Contagious diseases were more common than in Grinton parish, and Grinton, Reeth and Melbecks had superior dwellings. In 1800 most had been thatched, but by 1841 stone slates predominated. The people of these villages were relatively comfortably housed and well clothed, and they were clean and orderly in their habits. It is interesting to notice that among the miners who died between 1835 and 1841 the average age of those living in Grinton was 54 years, in Marrick 471/2 years, whereas bottom of the league were Arkendale and Muker, where the average age at death was 45 years. Harland didn't think much of these two parishes! In Arkengarthdale he describes the houses as having imperfect drainage and the habits of the people were "intemperate and filthy", skin diseases were very common and they were the victims of "typhus and other malignant fevers". I have often wondered about the sanitary provision at our mill. The old two seater privy straddles the stream in an outhouse (an original WC!) and the stream then wanders down to the village, where I have little doubt that at one time it had other domestic uses.

In Muker the high mortality rate may have been the result of the considerable distances miners had to walk to reach the mines in often inclement weather.

Harland certainly thought that this was a contributing factor. He does comment that most of the miners returned to sleep in their own houses. Although he puts the climate as a major reason for the chest infections so common in the dale, one does wonder a little about the diet that sustained the population at that time. The women of Marrick are reported to have had to work an eight hour day on tea for breakfast, bread and milk, and occasionally a little bacon with potatoes for dinner, and a supper of bread and milk. Not much sign of vegetables or fruit to help them resist infections. However, it is comforting to read in Harland's observations on the women and girls who worked out of doors. He said that there was no reason to believe that labour outside injured the manners and morals of the girls, but that invariably it was found that the girls "removed to the parish from manufacturing districts are unfit for domestic employment, their manners rude and vulgar, and of vicious habits". Back to the gardening ladies, but wrap up warm!

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Seven Beautiful Walks from Reeth One for Every Day of the Week - Part III

To Surrender Bridge

Before we push off for Surrender Bridge from Reeth Green, in high fettle (whoever heard of anyone being in low fettle anyway? - by the way, many years ago an old friend of mine, Lance-Naik Tafail Mohammed, 2/8th Punjab Regt., always used to end his letters "Hoping you to be in fine feathers ..." Ho! Ho!). As I was saying, before we push off in high fettle, I ought to mention that we shall be perilously close to the famous Coast to Coast Walk when we reach Surrender Bridge. It runs across the country from St Bee's Head to the Old Gang Mines, then to Surrender Bridge, and then keeps to the north of us over Novel Houses Hill and Cringley Bottom, then to Thirns, the over the shoulder of Calver Hill and so down the walled Skellgate Lane to Reeth.

The continous stream of Coast to Coast walkers are a very friendly crowd, ready to answer our "Hey-Ho!" with a chorus of greetings in Serbo-Croat or Portuguese, etc., but there are so many of them and sometimes deucedly noisy too with their portable telephones and radios giving the latest news from Stockholm or Vladivostock. Then there are the odd few motor-bikes ... So, on the whole, it's best not to cross their path - at least in the summer season.

Let us be off, from Reeth Green, down along the furlongs, past the old tennis court, to Healaugh. Every now and then we shall gaze spellbound at the marvellous scenery presented to us on Harkerside (which by now is so familiar to us, what? We were there on our yesterday's walk, for goodness' sake, and we can see Harkerside Place, the Milk jug, Maiden Castle, Shot Pot and we can even trace the tracks that we took. Isn't it wonderful to be able to do this!

At Healaugh we take the side road

sighposted to Kearton. The signpost says 'KEARTON', but lots of visitors have failed to find it and conclude that this is a road to to nowhere. But Kearton is **there** - it is one of several hamlets peculiar to Swaledale, beginning with Birkdale at the top and continuing with Scar Houses and Rash. We shall pass it on our return journey - and I shall have to tell you when we are doing so, because you won't know otherwise...

Soon we turn up the driveway to Thiernswood (a **right-of-way**, let me assure,ou). This is a shooting lodge which formerly belonged to the legendary Sir Joseph Nickerson - he died in March 1990. Having passed the place we find ourselves plodding along a truly delightful footpath in the Barney Beck Woods. I left a walking-stick in these woods somewhere, which by now will be under several feet of beech leaves. At least it has my name on it, so ...

There on the right is **Low Cringley**, where old Tommy Kendall farmed for many years. (he and his brother Frank did a huge wall-building job in our garden once upon a time. He, T., was a noted Dales singer in his day). This farm is a good example of a 'long-house', ie, where the farmer and family lived at one end and the farm stock at the other, providing free though smelly **central heating**, what? However, the roof is disintegrating rather rapidly and the place may already be past saving.

Presently the wood thins out and we do an unexpectedly steep descent to the Bleaberry Gill Beck - dashed tricky when the rains are out and you do have to cross rather carefully, being thankful when you reach 'the other side of Jordan', as it were. You now scramble up a cork-screwy track, gradient about 1 in 2 and whoopee! You are striding along the level top and soon in

sight of Surrender Mill and Bridge. Here you may munch hungrily and wolf-like at your Mars Bar and quaff some of your refreshing whisky, noting, by the way, that the Dales National Park have made an excellent job of keeping the Smelt Mill together, so that, though derelict, it does make sense.

To Grinton

If you look at your map you will see that it is no more than 2 miles to Grinton, and you will perhaps say, in a growling sort of voice, "I should jolly well think so - after yesterday's 8 or 9!

From Reeth Green we make our way to the Swing Bridge and then turn downstream alongside the river. This is called **Reeth Bottoms**, where the ramshackle plank bridge used to give access to the **School**, you remember, for the Harkerside children. Until a few years ago a couple of planks could still be seen, marooned in the middle of the river.

Your map tells you that there is a 'pit (dis)' hereabouts. Pit? What sort of pit? Coal pit? Snake pit?? Well, it's a pretty unusual one - a patch of white on the hillside gives you a clue - it's a marl pit, marl being a sort of limey clay, much used as a fertilizer in far-off days before the time of modern chemical stuff in plastic bags.

Notice the Arkle Beck here, where it joins the Swale, the scene of much flooding in the stormy season. Then Grinton becomes 'Grinton-on-Sea' - and dashed picturesque it looks too. On the hillside above you will see remnants of the great Fremington Dike, built by the ancient North British tribe, the Brigantes, as a defence against the invading Romans. Just above us you will also see **Dike House**. (Standing on Reeth Green, Tommy Kendall the retired farmer of Low Cringley, you remember, once asked "What d'ye call that house up there? pointing to Dike House. I said "Dike

House, of course". He said "Dike House? we always call it 'Dike 'Us' " and turned away in disgust ...)

Well, here we are at Grinton Church - 'a low, grey, spreading Perp church', says Pevsner in his monumental 'Buildings of England'. It is dark and solemn inside. There is an aura of great holiness here, after more than 800 years as a Christian outpost in this wild Dale, beside the river. Join a service here if you like, and after that you can make your way back to Reeth, either along the Mell Dykes (ie, a shady walk under the trees beside the wall on the main road), or through the Fremington Parks (along the footpath across the fields in front of Draycott Hall). You will, I hope, be feeling thoroughly pleased with yourself and thankful that vou have been able to do all these walks in the past week.


