

Seven Beautiful Walks from Reeth One for Every Day of the Week - Part II

To Castle

Well, here we are back on Reeth Green, and one of the prettiest and pleasantest walks is before us, to Castle along the banks of the Arkle Beck most of the way - and teeming with many interesting things to see.

For instance, what about Reeth Bridge? It was designed by the famous John Carr of York to replace an older bridge washed away in the great storms of the 1770s. In Swaledale alone this happened to practically every bridge: Reeth, Grinton, Downholme and Richmond and the great man attended to them all. (His greatest and best job is thought to be Greta Bridge in Teasdale).

Beyond Reeth Bridge there is a long row of what look like empty cow-houses, facing towards the petrol pumps and Weighell's Garage. They were built in the time of the Denys family of Draycott Hall as storehouses for the lead output from their Swaledale mines. At the far end of these is a rather neat little cottage for the Steward, who organised sales and transport. Some of the lead was shipped out from Stockton and some went to the Leadmarket in Darlington.

Put your best foot forward now and lets us be off, over the Mill Ings (ie, fields beside Reeth Mill, of which we can still see the weir). We pass Wood House, a one-time stronghold of the Simpsons, who went to Fremington School. There are still quite a number of Old Freningtonians about, all ploughing a pretty decent furrow thanks to the sound education they received when young. It would be interesting to know whether any Old Washfoldians survive from Washfold School at Hurst, which was built in 1880 for 78 pupils, and was still there in 1890 according to Bulmer's Directory. Perhaps they are still with us, scattered thinly these days, no doubt, but still wearing their OW tie on sporting occasions, what? (In purple & grey stripes, representing the heather and limestone moors all round the school).

We are heading for the packhorse track that comes all the way down from Langthwaite and is still a bridleway stunningly beautiful and full of interest for all of its 4 miles to Fremington. A Puzzle is the lime-kiln in the

middle of the wood. But lime is for improving pasture and grassland, so why here? The small quarry for obtaining limestone for the kiln is still visible close by, and coal would probably have come down by packhorse train from the Tan Hill collieries.

A wonderful array of wild flowers is to be seen everywhere, almost as if they had been planted by hand - primroses, cowslips, clumps of early purple orchids, sometimes growing among outcrops of shiny black flinilike lumps of chert which provide a wonderful contrast.

Once clear of the wood we come upon a field, at the edge of which is a derelict cottage, known as 'Boxer Peacock's'. Its main disadvantage is that it has no water supply. so, as if to compensate for this, the occupant of the waterless cottage built himself a rather ingenious wash-basin, with continuously running water, on a beck at the edge of the wood beside the track. At one time it had as an added refinement, a small shaving-mirror balanced on a twig! When our Walking Club was here in April we were amazed to see the sudden reappearance of the shaving mirror. balanced on its twig once more, complete with razor all ready for use. Needless to say. we took full advantage of this - a wash-&brush-up plus shave on the way? Of course! The proper name of this cottage is Castle Cottage and it had an outside lavatory (a twoholer) in a small outhouse nearby. The only occupant these days seems to be a goat. which gives passers-by a dashed noisy greeting from an upstairs window!

Another quarter-mile or so brings us to Castle Farm House. You walk right past the front of it and peer into each of the front rooms if you like. There never seems to be anybody there, although at one time there was a farmer named Robinson, with a wonderful RAF-type moustache, a proper handlebar Job! His wife Laura used to work at Catterick Camp. Every morning, early, she would run down to Reeth, crossing the bridge that we shall be crossing shortly, and catching the early morning Workers' Bus from Reeth Green. A dashed hectic routine, what? And every day a trial of strength and temper!

Down we go, following in her wake across the Arkle Beck in its gorgeous woodland setting, scrambling up the steep and rough track on the other side, and then across the fields back to Reeth. F.T.C.W.

Mr. John Robert (Jake) Stubbs

A well kown local Taxi-man and farmer has died at the age of 76.

Mr. John (Jake) Stubbs of Langthwaite, Arkengarthdale, was a well respected member of the community. He was born in Langthwaite, the eldest of three children to the late John Robert and 'Lizzie' Stubbs, who were local farmers and village shop keepers. John lived and worked on the farm all his life. John is survived by his wife Ella, (they have been married 43 years), son Robert, and two grandchildren Amy and Bethany. The farm and shop have been in the Stubbs family for all of this century and Ella continues to run the village shop. Jake was the oldest resident of Langthwaite, who was born in and continually lived in the village.

'Jake' was particularly known for his Taxiing Private Hire, Wedding and Funeral work. He was often called upon to taxi the 'stars' around during the extensive film making that went on in the Dales during the sixties, seventies and eighties. Many of the stars of films such as Jayne Eyre, Escape From The Dark, and the television series All Ceatures Great And Small, Woman Of Substance, the sequel Hold The Dream and Century Falls used his taxi services during their time working on the local film sets.

A keen supporter of Reeth Football club, he used to taxi players to games, and his taxi service was used many times for taking mothers and toddlers to the old Reeth Clinic. After the loss of local bus services, Jakes Taxi Service became the only public transport link out of Arkengarthdale. His Taxi was the first Swaledale Shared Hire Car Service during the inaugral year in 1986. It was always full!

Jake was very keen on Brass Band Music. having been a member of the Arkengarthdale Band before the war, and the Home Guard Band during the var.

In later years Jake took great enjoyment out

of watching sport on television.

The funeral service took place in St. Mary's Church, Arkengarthdale on Saturday August 28th. The service was taken by the Revd. Timothy Tunley, the organist was Mr. George Lundberg, The hymn, 'The Old Rugged Cross' was played on the Flugel Horn by Miss Emma Lundberg, as the funeral procession left the Church to the interrment in the Churchvard. The bearers were Stephen Stubbs (nephew), Trevor Atkinson (nephew). Lawrence Atkinson, Paul Harker, Malcolm Scott and Graham Curtis. The funeral arrangements were handled by John Blenkiron and Sons. Funeral Directors, Richmond.

The chief mourners were Ella Stubbs (wife). Robert and Allison Stubbs (son and daughter - in- law), Amy and Bethany Stubbs (grandchildren), Wille and Dorrie Stubbs (brother and sister-in-law), and George Graham (brother-in-law), Mr. and Mrs. W.W. Sunter (brother -in-law) and Mrs. J. Hunter (sister-in-law). The Church was full for the service, with standing room only, and the collection plate was donated equally to St. Mary's Church, and the Methodist Chapel, Arkengarthdale.

Mrs Spensley's Grouse Pate

(This is a good use for one of the older Grouse from the bag.)

Simmer the grouse gently in water or chicken stock, flavoured with two bay leaves, half a teaspoon of mixed herbs and an onion stuck with cloves. Keep it simmering until the bird is really soft and tender. Remove the Grouse, retain the liquid and continue to simmer until quite thick.

Scrape all the meat from the carcass and skin. Cut the meat into small pieces, and put through a mincer (or better a blender). Soften the pate with an ounce of butter for every 8 ounces of meat. If the meat is short in weight, ham can be used to make up to the half pound.

For flavouring add salt, lemon juice, pepper freshly ground and a pinch of mace.

The pate can be adjusted to the right consistency by adding some of the reduced liquid. Finally spoon the pate into a single flat pot or several individual pots, sealing the top with clarified butter.

It would be a great shame for the children if it had to close due to lack of a suitable venue.



Family Tax Benefits

Some good news for families, as from October the government is replacing Family Credit with a new benefit called Working Families Tax Credit. This will be paid by the Inland Revenue at the start but from April 2000 credit will be given by your employer through your wages. The new rules for this benefit are very generous and many families will be able to make a proper and rightful claim for this payment, particularly in this area which is nationally noted for a low pay structure.

This benefit, though called a 'Tax Credit' has nothing whatever to do with Income Tax or being in work and paying tax.

Rules to Qualify or this benefit are:

- A) You must be working for at least 16 hours per week,
- B) You must have a child or children under the age of 18 years.
- C) You must be a UK citizen and
- D) You must not have more than £ 7999 worth of savings.

If you satisfy these conditions then you should get your wages topped up to what the government has decided is a minimum reasonable income. The actual amount of top up: Tax Credit payable depends on your net earnings. Net earnings are normally what you are left with after tax, National Insurance and one half of any pension contribution is deducted from your total earnings. If your net weekly earnings are less than £90 you will receive the maximum benefit. If your net earnings are more than £90 per week then the benefit is reduced by 55p for each £ over that figure. The award, once allowed will normally be paid for a period of six months after which a new assessment will take place and a further award made should you still be entitled to the benefit. REETH COUNTY PRIMARY SCHOOL NEWS

A Level Playing Field - Those of you who attended Reeth School, or who have been parents of children at the school, will be familiar with the uneven surface of the playing field, formerly a gerden. If you attended the school some tine age you may have unwisely agreed to enter the Mothers or Fathers Race on Sports Day only to find the ground disappearing from under your feet as you nicely got into your stride. As a pupil in more recent years you may have been frustrated as you played a ball game to find the ball always making its way to one side of the field and thinking you would be a better player if you had one leg longer than the other. So the Friends of the School decide to create a smooth surface for the children who attend the school at present and for those who willbe there in the years ahead. Planning permission had to be obtained, and the archaeologists and other interested parties consulted.



It's a Doc's Life

A column with a medical slant

Continuing our history of medical men in the Dales we come to Thomas Bowes. He was practicing in the 1820's with Dr.'s Hutchinson, Robinson and Close whom we mentioned last month. I do not know when he was born but he was baptised on 2nd April 1780 and he married a lady called Catherine Alderson. He came from a Dales family as his father was baptised in 1751 and his grandfather in 1728. He had a son, Henry Thomas who was born in 1806, unfortunately in November the following year he buried his daughter Margaret. He is mentioned in Bain's gazetteer of 1823.

In January 1811 John McCollah was born. He went to the same medical school as me, Guy's in London. He qualified MRCS LSA in 1834 at the age of 23. Medical education was not as well organised then as it is now. He would have been apprenticed to a surgeon and would have had to attend a certain number of operations in order to get a certificate to practice. He started work in Reeth in 1835.

The History of the North Riding of Yorkshire May 1871 states the John McCollah was a surgeon and dispenser in Reeth and in the census of 1851 it states that he was major landowner (aaah, the benefits of private practice) with 14 houses in the Dale.

John McCollah was asked to give evidence to the standing committee appointed to look into the health of miners in England and Wales. This committee travelled to many areas where mining was a major employer and interviewed people about the health of the miners. Under the chairmanship of Lord Kinnaird they eventually produced the Kinnaird report. On the 3rd March 1863 in Leyburn they interviewed Adam Barker, son of Dr. Robert Barker whom I mentioned last month. Adam was the agent for the Whitaside and Summer Lodge mines and in his evidence states that some boys of a robust disposition were working in the mines at only 10 years old. Later that same day John McCollah gave evidence to the committee. He stated that he had observed the presence of chest disease in miners, usually starting as chronic bronchitis. He said that he advised miners so affected to stop working, but many of them continued despite this. He observed that few survived beyond the age of fifty years. During his time in Reeth however he saw an improvement in health of many local people, due he said, to a better mode of living and a better diet (I expect that it was about this time that the chip van started to come around!). He also noticed a decline in scrofula (a fascinating condition worth a whole column on it's own).

The best possible news for Scott Trial enthusiasts everywhere is that the Yorkshire Dales National Park has now given permission for the Trial to go ahead for the next five years. All credit to John Frazer, David Allison, President Andrew Brown, Angela and Richard Sunter and many others for the endless behind the scenes administrative efforts to make this possible. They really appreciate so much back up from land owners, farmers, keepers and local councils who have been such a help.

It is worth recalling that the Scott Trial first took place in 1914 in the same form as now. A course of 70 to 80 miles of rough Yorkshire moorland including rocky climbs, horrendous descents, bogs and water splashes. The spirit of the riders has obviously not changed a bit. After last years terrific downpour and flooding, it was widely believed that riders would be put off. Not so. Instead an almost record breaking entry of 175 fit, tough riders prepared to take on the hardest trial in the country.

The Scott is a time and observation Trial which means that the fastest man round sets standard time and all other riders lose marks on time as well as observation. The course begins near Marske and takes the riders on an out and back route as far as Gunnerside Gill and back. Some idea of the severity of the event can be realised when 100 of the 175 riders managed to finish in time. The fastest man round was Wayne Braybrook in 5 hours 11 minutes, whereas James Percival finished out of time in 8 hours 18 minutes.

Outright winner with his third success was the man rated fourth in the world at present, Graham Jarvis riding a Bultaco. This firm has recently come back to making Trials bikes again with their enormously successful "Sherpa" model which won the manufacturers Team Prize. The team comprised Graham Jarvis, local star Philip Alderson (plagued all day by a series of punctures) and Sam Connor, one of the brightest of the young stars.

In second overall place was Martin Crosthwaite and third Ben Hemingway. Out of 8 local "Gazette" area riders only two managed to complete the course in time. A great tussle took place between President Andrew Brown and Mark Sunter with honours eventually going to Andrew by the narrow margin of 5 marks. The Lundberg brothers, although not finishers, managed to raise over £100 for local charities by sponsorship. Alan Brown did well to finish but unfortunately was just out of time. There were enforced retirements John Sunter, Alan Kendal and Paul Terry. The honour of Richmond Club was upheld by Philip Alderson (11th) Stephen Lambert (21st) David Watson (31st) Mark Willis (32nd) Les Richardson (38th) and Alan Richardson (41st) riding in his 25th Scott Trial. After the desperate conditions of last year, congratulations to John Fraser and Ron Bailey, Clerk of the Course and Assistant Clerk of the Course respectively for producing such a super course. It speaks volumes for the interest and

enthusiasm of people for the Scott Trial.



POWER TO THE PEOPLE - OLDER PEOPLES FORUMS

The encouragement of opinion and a wish to hear the voices of older people is at the centre of the Better Government for Older People programme. Here are outlined ways in which the views and interests of older people can be heard as part of this process — older peoples forums and advocacy schemes.

Older People's Forums

Forums give a collective voice to older people on the issues which concern them at a local level. Forums vary in terms of their histories, membership and interests reflecting local needs, circumstances and experiences. Many may also form part of a broader movement of older people at a national level. The first older people's Forums were established over a decade ago in Strathclyde and London. More recently there has been a relatively rapid development of such groups throughout Britain. The impetus or this has come from several sources, including:

The requirements of central government for local authorities to consult and involve local communities in relation to policy, planning and service provision, and the long standing efforts of some local authorities to listen and

respond to local voices of opinion.

 The initiatives of voluntary organisations seeking to support Forums and related bodies. This includes the recent Help the Aged Speaking Up For OUR Age campaign in which £250,000 of UK Grants Programme has been allocated to the establishment of Forums basically to represent the views and interests of older people.

The demands of older people themselves to be heard. Some forums sprang from connections with the organised pensioners' movement, others more

organically from within organisations within local communities.

Locally following surveys of various groups/ associations for older folk, including your own local Swaledale & Arkengarthdale Luncheon Clubs Association, there has been formed a Richmondshire Senior Forum. This is a service especially for those over 55years of age and gives a chance for you to have your say on any issue which affects you, whatever particular concerns you may have, at this Forum you will be able to have your say. Shared views and thoughts can be put into action. Meetings of the Forum will provide a place to share concerns over issues that affect us all and together you may be able to change things with advantages to all. Just think for a minute,... how many times this week you have started a sentence with "I just wish that..." or "If only we could...." Or "Isn't it ridiculous how?..". Well come and say these things to a group of like minded people and surely together we can do something about these concerns.

The Proms'

The now traditional 'Proms Concert' in Arkengarthdale Methodist Church was held on October 8th. The Church was again full, and the concert was given to a very receptive and lively audience. The Reeth Brass Band started the programme off with Bandology – a very good lively concert march. This was followed by Oregon - a descriptive piece following the pioneers who opened the 'Western' parts of America. This was the piece the band played in the recent Hardraw Scar Competition. At Hardraw Scar, the band won the Best Hymn Tune by an Unregistered band - well done. They then played a very upbeat number called Cornfield Rock - by the same composer as Oregon - J. De Haan. The Parish Choir took over, completely changing the mood. In excellent voice they sang three pieces of a sacred nature. ably accompanied by Margaret Harker. who had to use the organ in the first half due to a technical hitch with the electronic keyboard. The songs were Praise God! Sing All Ye Heavens (a modern setting of a tune by Mozart taken from his Missa Brevis in F), a concert version of the hymn Blaenwern (Love Divine All Loves Excelling), and Keep The Flame Alive. The band then returned to play Irvin Berlin's There's No Business Like Show Business, this was followed by

Young Amadeus and they finished the first half of the concertwith a selection – London Celebration, which showed some fine solo playing.

After the interval the Choir sang the folk song Bobby Shafto, a very quick, short and amusing rendition. This was followed by an unaccompanied number – The Way We Were, and they finished with a tribute to Andrew Lloyd Webers music – A Concert Celebration. This piece was a selection from the shows – Joseph and His Amazing Colour Dreamcoat, Phantom Of The Opera, Cats, Jesus Christ Superstar and Evita.

The band then followed with an unusual piece called Caribbean Cameo – a descriptive piece with the expected carribean feel, in three movements. The whole evening then finished with the Band, the Choir (in an extremely lively and energetic mood who took great delight in covering the band with "loo" rolls and letting off party poppers!) and audience giving a hearty rendition(with encores!) of Fantasy On British Sea Songs, Pomp And Circumstance March Number One and Jerusalem.

Just one little thing – what about the National Anthem on such an occasion ? – perhaps next year! An excellent evenings entertainment.


