

MARRICK PRIORY OUTDOOR EDUCATIONAL CENTRE

Marrick Priory was established as a residential Outdoor Education Centre in the 1960's and was formally dedicated as such on 30th. May, 1970, by the Bishop of Ripon (Dr. John Moorman). Since then it has continued to flourish and develop as a Centre of considerable quality. It offers a wide variety of opportunities and experiences for young people and for adults, in the beautiful setting of our area. The Priory is a Charitable Trust, under its own Board of Trustees and with close associations with the Diocese of Ripon. Getting close to the natural environment, living in a community, sharing in relationships, personal and social development, and quietness and reflection are all key aspects of the educational work of the priory.

Many of the activities are either specifically designed, or can be carefully slanted to enable groups to explore their strengths and weaknesses, how to function together as a team, how to tackle and solve problems, how to motivate each other and how to communicate effectively. Interdependence and trust are key features of the work and this approach to programmes is relevant to older children and young people, college groups, youth clubs, industrial trainees and to certain voluntary organisations. For many young people the Priory gives them their very first experience of being away from home overnight. The Centre is organised in a very efficient and effective manner and has a caring well qualified and experienced staff.

The Priory was originally established in the twelfth century and for quite obvious and practical reasons was built in the shelter of the middle reaches of Swaledale. The notice from Roger de Aske to the Archbishop of York, recording the foundation of the Priory is dated between the years 1154 and 1158. Roger gave the house for nuns following the rule of St. Benedict and with it were given the Parish Church of Marrick. Once established the Priory became the home of several of Roger de Aske's own daughters and indeed most of the nuns were from families of local landowners and merchants.

On the 17th. November 1540, the King's Commissioners evicted Christobel Cowper, Prioress, together with sixteen nuns. (The novel "The Man on a Donkey written by Hilda Prescott tells the story of Marrick Priory in the days leading to the seizure by the crown and it is believed that the author modelled her fictitious Prioress on Christobel Cowper, who was born in 1495 and was the daughter of a Richmond wool merchant).

The Priory Church, like many of its kind, continued to be used as a place of worship for the parish until the 1960's.

Considerable building work has taken place since the Educational Centre was established, including a warden's dwelling, improved dormitories and a fine conversion of the Prioress's house to form a common meeting room. An Appeals Committee, under the Chairmanship of General Sir Charles Huxtable, exists and is currently raising funds for a major building programme to improve the facilities even further.

"The Friends of Marrick Priory"

Individuals and organisations are invited to become "Friends of the Priory" by making a small annual donation and in recent times a good number of our Friends have entered into deeds of covenant with us. Friends are kept informed of developments at the Centre and are invited to visit and to support our fund raising ventures.

The Friends Sub-Committee uses the income raised to buy items of equipment, both educational and domestic and also supports the Bursary Fund. This fund is an important one in that it allows the Warden to subsidise the cost of courses for young people whose families may be suffering social or financial difficulties. in simple terms no child should be excluded form a course at the Centre because his/her family cannot afford the fees. You are invited to consider giving your support to this worthy cause.

Swaledale lost a well-known and much respected resident last month with the death in May of Mr Bill Kitching, of Reeth.

Muker's Declaration of Independence Approved 1580

After Aysgarth, Grinton was probably one of the largest parishes in the country, even if much of it was inhabited by sheep rather than by human beings. To add to it's problems the parish church of St Andrew was, and is, situated close to the eastern end of the parish, hence the well known Corpse Way down the dale for the final journey of parishioners from all villages and hamlets to the western area of the parish.

It would appear that by 1580 those folk at the western end managed to get their voices heard, with the result that the Bishop of Chester (in which Diocese the parish lay at that time, having been carved out of York in 1541) seems not only to have heard what was being said, but he acted upon it with a degree of independence denied to any modern day bishop. He gave licence that baptisms, marriages and burials should be allowed to take place at Muker, even though all fees were to continue to be paid to the Vicar of Grinton as hitherto.

An interesting memorandum to this effect appears in the Parish burial register for 1674/5. It would appear that the bishop's initiative in this matter did not receive unanimous approval!!. The memorandum (with original spelling) is set out below:

"Memorandum that William Chatterton Bishop of Chester upon the third day of August being Wednesday Anno Dom: 1580: came to Muker Chappell and did Allow the Inhabitants there to Baptize, Marry and to Bury and to Minister the Sacraments of the Church according to the prescribed order set downe in the Book e of Common prayer. Provided that the said Inhabitants pay all their Ecclesiastical dutyes to the Vicar of Grinton of Burialls, Wedings, Churchings as they did before the Grant and to pay all other dutyes to their said Church. And the said Inhabitants to beare the whole charge of aMinister to serve att Muker.

This Licence the Bishop granted wthout consent of her Majestie who is the Patron^s, and without consent of their Vicar of Grinton and but during the Bishop's pleasure.

Francis Atkinson was Vicar of Grinton 1658 - 1673

The charges payable to the Vicar of Grinton obtained until1750 when the inhabitants of Muker successfully petitioned the Archdeacon of Richmond to resist the claim of the Grinton church.

CRIME IN THE DALES

In the last year or two the Gazette hasn't published much about the policing of our dales. How are our Daleswatch volunteers getting on, I wonder? I haven't heard of much theft recently either, so the presence of our gallant night watchmen and women must be having some effect. Mind you, crime in the dales is nothing new. In fact in the past it was sometimes bloody and violent. Talk of thieves coming over the hills from Teeside and Weardale puts me in mind of some stories my father told about the poaching miners from Weardale, who in the 19th Century periodically came marauding at the top of Swaledale. The framers were scared of these ferocious visitors and called them the Weardale Warriors'.

Paul Armstrong, a man of herculean physique, was their leader and the terror of the farmers and gamekeepers alike. The 'warriors' came, led by Armstrong, with guns and dogs and would spend a whole day helping themselves to stock and whatever else they could find. The locals were too frightened to intervene and gave them a wide berth. On one occasion they were observed by old Cherry Kearton, the gamekeeper. He watched them from a distance until nightfall when he saw the gang enter Rakeshaw's cowhouse at Crook Seal Farm, on the Kirby Stephen road near Birkdale Tarn

He hurriedly summoned some local farmers. There was George and Charles Alderson from Hilltop, George at Birtle (Alderson), Neddy Alderson and Harry Tom from Hoggarths, and Rakestraw... another surrounded the cowhouse, armed with guns, and waited till dawn. At daybreak Paul Armstrong was seen at the forking hole and was heard to say to his gang, 'A fair morning men. We must be up and off The Swaledalers jumped to their feet and pointing their guns at him attempted to arrest him. He swore to shoot anyone who made a move. A shot was fired. The farmers waited. After a while Armstrong feigned capitulation seeing resistance useless. He then tried to rush the door but Neddy Alderson knocked him on the head with the butt of his gun and finally all were captured. History does not relate what became of them.

Crook Seal seems to have been the scene of an even more violent incident, perhaps because it was so remote. Over 200 years ago Crook seal was tenanted by an old bachelor who always slept with a shot gun in case of robbers in this lonely spot.

One night he did indeed hear someone trying to open his door. Unable to gain access there was

an sattempt to get through a window. There being no glass, as it was turfed up over the bars, he was thwarted again. The farmer heard after a few minutes silence a scullling on the roof, and to his horror saw that the determined robber was removing some of the slates to gain entry. Against the night sky he saw the silhouette of a man and at once discharged his gun at the figure. The intruder slid and crashed to the ground, there was the sound of running footsteps and then silence. In the morning a trail of blood could be followed along the road till it finally became indistinct.

Many years later a peat cutter found a human skeleton nearby on the moor. The old farmer was long since dead himself, but the assumption was that these were the last remains of the robber of Crook Seal. For many years travellers alleged that the building was haunted, and that strange noises could be heard as one passed on a dark night!

AFFORDABLE HELICOPTER or FEET ON THE GROUND LOCALS ?? Dales Ambulance Options

The Meeting of the Swaledale Christian Council held on Monday, 8th May at the United Reform Church, Low Row, was addressed by Chief Ambulance Officer Mr. Gary Vale of the Tees East & North Yorkshire Division, based at York, accompanied by Mr. Mike Shanahann, the Divisional Officer for the same Division. Introduced by Professor Gerald Scott, a member of the Christian Council, he explained that at a number of Parish Forums throughout the area, questions had been posed in respect of Safety and in particular, Medical Safety, in the Dales and Upper Dales, following the closure of the Duchess of Kent Hospital at Catterick. It was at the local Swaledale Parish Forum that Mr. Shanahann made an offer to come and address the subject of Medical Safety with respect to ambulances and the response times, and other matters surrounding this issue.

Professor Scott then welcomed Mr. Gary Vale who proceeded to give a very detailed and well thought out resume of the present and proposed response by the ambulance service within the Upper Dales and remote valley areas. The Yorkshire Ambulance Trust is simply a provider of services purchased by the Community Health Council, and the Ambulance Trust has to work within Government guidelines in respect of ambulance response times. The Government looked at the clinical consequences of response times, these are continually reviewed and certainly there is some confusion and concern by the public to these timed responses. Most government guidelines refer to a normal ambulance manned by two ambulance personnel but different criteria apply to a Qualified paramedic on a motor bike. Further the percentages required by the guidelines take into account not just the time taken to arrive at the scene of an accident but the total time to remove a patient to a suitable hospital. Mr. Vale gave details of the various category call outs;-

(a) life threatening, (b) serious, and (c) miscellaneous, all 999 calls are monitored at Headquarters and the category (a) takes precedence over categories (b) and (c), and therefore a broken leg, even though received first at Control, may be third in the queue when consideration is given by the Control Room staff to calls received at a later time, which are under category (a) life threatening, this sometimes means an ambulance will be diverted to the life threatening call

Mr. Vale further explained that there was presently some government new money to assist in extending the service and consideration had been given to the use of an air ambulance. This proposal had to be considered in the overall scheme as opposed to the purchase of new ambulances and the placing and determination of ambulance stations and personnel; finally it will be a case of obtaining the most suitable and efficient service which will, in the long term, be of most benefit to the community in this Division. A number of options were listed by Mr. Vale, particularly for the Upper Dales, and he firmly placed much emphasis upon public participation and the training of local volunteers who would be able to use the latest emergency equipment. This equipment, including defibrillators, to be based in either local village or church halls, to be called on by the trained volunteers, as required.

AMBULANCE OPTIONS cont..

The volunteers working on standby rota to be called out to an incident by telephone from ambulance headquarters. The intention being to save lives by trained local personnel with the right equipment reaching the scene many minutes before the full time ambulance. Another problem which causes delay in the remote dales areas is sometimes finding the address or location, and consideration is being given to the purchase of computer software which gives a map reference. Again with local volunteers knowledge of the area this would overcome any element of delay in reaching an incident. Appeals could soon be made to folk with some qualification or interest in these proposals to undertake training locally in readiness to respond to any new scheme or developments. Further consideration is being given to all the listed proposals. Prof. Scott thanked both Mr Gale and Mr Shanahann for attending the meeting and Mr Gale for such a detailed and honest appraisal of the current and proposed situation.

They contribute nothing to the Dale; most of them are at, or near retirement age so don't bring children with them. Aye the Dale is dying". So a 'local' was heard to say recently and many more 'locals' will no doubt nod their heads in agreement. Certainly the Dale is changing. Just as it has always done, for example when the lead mining industry collapsed. However, in those days people did not sit back, they turned to farming and building work to earn a living.

Currently there are many options open to people, provided they are willing and able to work and use the natural beauty and resources of the Dale. For example, cheese and cream production in Wensleydale; breweries in other dales; open farms for school visits and families could be expanded. Some farmers have opened restaurants and dales people have for centuries produced knitwear. 'Incomers' have introduced other skills and arts and crafts. The list of products which could be yielded locally is almost endless and the number of outsiders who know and love the Dale means that there is a market out there. Many 'incomers' have started a business or work from home. Even a small bed and breakfast establishment attracts visitors who spend money locally.

Most 'incomers' do not sit back. They take part in social activities which they or their fellow 'incomers' have organised. Without these a large part of village life would die. One example is the luncheon clubs for senior citizens, started and successfully run for five years now by 'incomers'. There are numerous examples of people who have launched a preject or activity, for the good of the community.


