



It's a Doc's Life

I know I said I wasn't going to write anymore but I could not resist the gauntlet thrown down by our new minister, David Gregson in his letter about creation. Firstly, I must say that I fully respect his right to hold whatever views he wants to but I, myself, do not believe there is any difference between the stories of creation as told in the Bible and our current understanding of the origin of life on Earth. For example, in the opening chapters of Genesis in my Bible, it says, "The Earth was without form and void and darkness was on the face of the deep". Our current understanding of the origin of the Earth is that it condensed from a huge rotating cloud of gas and dust called a nebula. The Earth, without form, would have coalesced from the dust grains in this nebula drawn by gravity to form larger and larger bodies and eventually planets. 


